Who Are We?

The Bible has a lot to say about **commitment** in various aspects of our lives: to our families, our neighbors, employers, the church, even our health. (Ephesians 6:5; Hebrews 10:25; I Corinthians 6:19, 31)

But the Bible also teaches that the chief commitment of our lives is to God Himself. *READ Matthew 22:37-38*

Why does Jesus say that every fiber of our being, every facet of our lives must be committed to loving and serving God?

Jesus says, "We must deny ourselves, pick up our Cross and follow Him." READ Mark 8:34-38 Discuss what this means and what it personally requires of disciple of Jesus?
